Successes:

The material for the Introduction to Palliative Care for Multi-professionals course has been reviewed. A few minor adjustments were made. The revised material has been accredited by SAMA/HPCSA for 25 clinical and 2 ethical cpd points.

Challenges:

Late negotiations with districts to arrange training is hampering the number of training sessions conducted and we strongly encourage every district to arrange training as early as possible with the relevant hospices.

Short numbers of participants at planned training sessions make achieving targets difficult. The maximum number of participants at training sessions is 30 and when less than this are present the achieving of targets become more difficult.

Training is taking place in some of the districts without training partners. This has been difficult to organise and the numbers reached will be lower than targets.
